Encouraging Signs for Our Economy

Look beyond the national headlines of financial meltdowns and Wall Street bailouts, and you will see encouraging signs for the Rochester area's economy.

Long a drag on downtown development, Midtown Plaza will soon be replaced by the world headquarters of PAETEC Holding Corp. The development will establish a new urban core in the heart of Rochester, surrounded by office, retail and residential housing.

A few blocks east, ESL Federal Credit Union is building a new headquarters to accommodate 300 employees on Chestnut Street. To the south, the Brooks Landing Project is making significant headway with the recent opening of an 80-unit hotel that will anchor restaurants, offices and retail space.

Brooks Landing will draw traffic across the Genesee River from the epicenter of Rochester's job growth and economic optimism – the University of Rochester's River Campus and Medical Center.

Across Rochester, entrepreneurs are opening small businesses and creating the kind of jobs that keep the economic momentum moving.

There, the University's leaders are astutely guiding a \$500 million Strategic Plan to place the Medical Center among the top 20 medical centers the nation. This plan will bring millions of dollars in research funding to the area, which will become

the new foundation of the area's job creation as these medical advances are spun off into marketable products.

And not all of our developments are on such a grand scale. Across Rochester, entrepreneurs are opening small businesses and creating the kind of jobs that keep the economic momentum moving. The Public Market area, for example, has seen a host of new business activity in recent months, including the Station 55 loft apartments and retail space, and new locations for the new Rohrbach Brewing Co. and the Boulder Coffee Co.

The central theme that runs across all of these projects is confidence. This combination of strategic government spending and private-sector investments total well over \$1 billion, which represent a powerful sense of faith in the Rochester's area's potential.

And this confidence rests on Rochester's most important asset – its skilled workforce. That's why partners such as RochesterWorks! play such an important role in this region's economic vitality. By creating a link to training and networking opportunities, this agency helps job seekers find employment and prevents them from moving away from the area.

Our people are the pride of Rochester. I am grateful that RochesterWorks! is doing its part to keep them here.

21,500 Job Seekers Turn to RochesterWorks! to Find Jobs – Up 21% Over Last Year

RochesterWorks! Career Centers served more than 21,500 job seekers in the 2007-08 fiscal year with new and enhanced services. The increase was accommodated despite a third consecutive year of funding cuts that totaled \$2 million.

- Total visits: 66,526 (20% increase over previous year of 53,394)
- Total customers: 21,583 (21% increase over previous year of 17,151)
- Total finding employment: 7,907
- Total trained: 3,471 (job seekers and workers)
- Total recruitment events: 75

RochesterWorks! faced these significant challenges, by increasing use of technology and forging stronger partnerships with businesses, government and organizations. Enhanced services included:

- Robust Indeed job search tools featuring spidering technology, communication tools including electronic job seeker networking, LinkedIn, and the Virtual Job Fair.
- Expanded skills assessment and skill development services, including the WorkKeys System, KeyTrain and Prove It!
- Regularly connecting businesses with job seekers at the RochesterWorks! Career Center through weekly on-site open recruitment days.
- Serving more youth by partnering with the City of Rochester Summer of Opportunity Program.
- Preparing welfare recipients for jobs by cofunding programs with the Department of Human Services.
- Working closely with the Department of Labor to expand services to job seekers through Career Centers.

Assessing and Certifying Skills Gives Job Seekers and Employers Competitive Edge

Today more than ever, people looking for work must be prepared to stand out from other candidates and document their abilities to learn new skills and keep up with changing technology. This year RochesterWorks! introduced three new assessment and skill development tools — WorkKeys, KeyTrain, and Prove It, to help job seekers better assess their skills and trainability, and increase and document skills to employers.

WorkKeys

The WorkKeys job skills assessment program measures “real world” skills that are critical to job success. The program is valuable for any occupation and at any level of education, connecting work skills, training, and testing. WorkKeys is the basis for the National Career Readiness Certificate (CRC), a career credential that certifies that job seekers have the core employability skills required across all industries and occupations. The CRC validates job applicants’ skill levels in Reading for Information, Locating Information, and Applied Mathematics.



Job Seekers Assessed

Since January 2008, of 273 job seekers, 84% have attained Career Readiness Credentials; 23% attained the Gold Level, 54% attained the Silver Level, and 23% attained the Bronze Level.

Several local manufacturers are requiring the CRC as part of the job application process. In addition, local community employment and training programs are using the WorkKeys

system to ensure that individuals have the foundation skills required to be successful in a particular job or career.

KeyTrain

The comprehensive KeyTrain computer-based training system was designed specifically for WorkKeys. Individuals can assess their potential WorkKeys score through pre-tests, review topics, practice problems, and increase their skills. KeyTrain is offered at no cost to RochesterWorks! members.

Prove It!

This Internet-based skills assessment program provides more than 900 tests for clerical, software, industrial, healthcare, financial and technical job classifications. It also offers 24 training tutorials for Microsoft Office 2000 – 2003 titles. Job seekers can take these objective skill assessments to enhance their resumes and cover letters, use during interviews, target skills employers are looking for, better understand specific skills to upgrade, and stand out from other candidates competing for the same positions.



Since RochesterWorks! began offering Prove It to job seekers, more than 200 people have taken advantage of the on-line tutorials to develop or improve their skills in Microsoft Word, Excel, Access, Outlook, PowerPoint, and even QuickBooks, Internet Explorer, and Windows. Close to 1000 job seekers have taken assessments to identify skills or gaps in skills.

RochesterWorks! Helps 1,800 Businesses Gain Competitive Edge

RochesterWorks! extensive services to businesses, most free of charge, are helping make Greater Rochester a premier place for employment opportunities and a rich source of talent for businesses. Serving as an extension of businesses’ human resource departments, RochesterWorks! assists businesses in training, recruiting and restructuring their workforces.

In the past year RochesterWorks! served more than 1,800 businesses. More than 1,000 businesses took advantage of free job postings on RochesterWorks! Web site and almost

100 businesses participated in recruitment events sponsored by RochesterWorks!

Training grant assistance to companies in Monroe County and the Greater Rochester region supports local economic development efforts by ensuring a skilled, competitive workforce. Training achievements included:

- Total businesses receiving training grants: 154
- Total number of workers trained: 2,514

Preparing Youth for Career Success

Working together with program operators, businesses and organizations, each year RochesterWorks! helps thousands of young people prepare for, search and secure year-round and summer employment. This past year there was a huge response to all programs.

Year round Employment Programming Serves Nearly 900 Youth

Through six in-school and five out-of-school programs, youth receive support to stay in school, attain a diploma, and better prepare for college, apprenticeship and the world of work. Services include academic assistance, career awareness and exploration, structured work experience, and job search and placement assistance.

RochesterWorks! and City of Rochester Team up in Summer Employment Program

For the first time, RochesterWorks! and the City of Rochester – Summer of Opportunity Program successfully joined forces and combined resources to help local teenagers prepare for summer jobs. Together we released a single application for summer employment and offered job readiness workshops, parent orientations, and practice interviews to interested youth. The two entities also provided funding to local partners for summer jobs and programming.

More than 1,200 youth were connected to summer work opportunities. Even more were prepared for future job searches through participation in the application process. Through a partnership with Monroe County

Department of Human Services and the NYS Office Temporary and Disability Assistance RochesterWorks! provided funding for 22 summer youth employment programs.

Students participated in career exploration and paid work experiences with more than 300 different private, public, and faith-based partners. The City of Rochester added 10 employment programs and leveraged additional work sites with local business.

Digital Skills Gives Youth Paid Internships

Digital Skills is an innovative program that trains high school students in critical business and technical skills and provides them with paid internships at local companies. The rigorous program administered by RochesterWorks! was established in 2005 and is offered in conjunction with New York Wired for Education, local school districts and businesses. A grant from NY State Senator Joe Robach helps fund the program. Between fall 2007 and summer 2008, 60 youth participated in self-directed e-learning of online facilitated soft and technical (Microsoft) skills curriculum. Fifty-one students took part in paid internships at 30 participating businesses. The program was a win-win for all involved.
